## Rev Maile Molitika – Minister's Message <u>"Hola pee te ke hao ki he fale 'o Vave"</u>

You may wonder what a funny topic we have, but this is one of the Tongan Proverbs, and it means - Flee to the house of Vave so you'll be safe. The origin of this proverb comes from a place called Ha'avaka'otua and this place was located in the western part of the capital of Tonga, Nuku'alofa. Vave was a great warrior and he was well known for his bravery, no one can challenge him and live. All his enemies are afraid of him. **His house is like a Lighthouse** for the people in this area. When someone is in trouble, all he does is look for Vave's house so his life can be spared. If someone was assaulted and was in danger, that person would run quickly to the house of Vave.

Once he entered Vave's house, he is saved. So the meaning of this proverb is about someone who saves people from their opponents. You have to run as quick as you can to the house of Vave, so you'll be safe and sound.

In a way, this is like a refuge for people whose life is in danger, and also people who run away from their enemy. Why using this Tongan proverb in this NeXus Journal? Well, to be honest, we all need safety. Safety first is what we hear all the time at work places and everywhere people are. This proverb is an example of a place of safety for people who seek assistance in time of trouble. It is about our physical safety. We run to this house and assure that once we enter the door, our troubles are over. No one can trouble us anymore.


Being safe in our spiritual journey, that is the utmost hope that we are looking to as followers of Christ. As people of God, we are on a journey too, and there are so many troubles and problems that we face in our journey of faith. If we are not careful in our daily walking, the devil will make us divert and be part of his gang.

Ephesians 6:13 is a reminder for us. The armour of God represents the defence we must take in our spiritual lives. We are not fighting a physical body of flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil spirit who seeks to destroy us. If we put on God's armour, then we will win this battle. There is no need for us to run to Vave's house anymore. The ultimate safety comes from God. We have to put on the full armour of God, so that when the day of evil comes, we may be able to stand firm.

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# SHOCK PROOF



Port Fairy Lighthouse, Great Ocean Road, Victoria

I love lighthouses! All along our coastline they stand as silent sentinels warning coastal shipping of hazardous headlands and dangerous coastlines. Have you ever wondered why a lighthouse is built the way it is? A lighthouse is in fact a tall, tapered cylinder, designed to withstand the savage elements of the rocky capes where they stand.

They can withstand incredibly strong winds and gales because their cylindrical shape deflects the winds around them. Seldom does one hear of a lighthouse collapsing in a storm!

They are designed to be storm proof.

In the devastation of Darwin (Christmas 1974), the houses, which were constructed during a time of stable weather, were not designed to withstand such an intense storm as Cyclone Tracey. The people of Darwin learned from bitter experience that *it's too late to build when the storm comes!* The real building must be done during the calm, peaceful days, with sufficient foresight to withstand the most severe tests of nature.

Human experience is so much like the weather: diverse, unpredictable, fickle and at times, even devastating. Yet, while one cannot predict what may befall us in the days ahead, we can design our lives so as to withstand the stresses which will most surely come upon us.

Tragically, it is only when calamity overwhelms us that we discover how inadequate our life-construction has been. We can construct buildings and skyscrapers to withstand incredible environmental stresses - fire, cyclone, earthquake - yet we have not learned how to frame our lives in such a way as to withstand the stresses of life itself.

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However, in a split second our active and relatively healthy lives radically changed. <u>We had a car **accident which changed everything**</u>.

It happened so suddenly, and so unexpectedly (as most road accidents are!). In a moment it was all over and quite suddenly I found myself totally dependent upon others for my very life, my basic needs; immobilised on a hospital bed in a small, remote country town. Unable to read, without radio or TV, I found myself thrown back on the only resources I had: my own inner reserve of spirituality.

Over many years (often without realising it), I had been building into my life certain spiritual disciplines of prayer, meditation and inner worship. In my immobilised state, I recalled to mind the lines of favourite hymns, prayers and scriptures which I had memorised, many from my youth. It was these which sustained me through long lonely hours, in the dead of night, when I was without any human company. I had been building, slowly but surely over the years, and when the crisis came, my inner spiritual reserve sustained me. But it is too late to ask, "Where is God?" when the storm comes!

How then can we shock-proof our lives? <u>Truly, if you want an enduring structure</u> you must build with enduring materials

The things which endure are those which are essentially eternal: truth, integrity, beauty, love, joy, kindness, thoughtfulness, patient listening to others, gentleness... <u>Eternal values are everlasting</u>! As we build these into our lives, so we are building eternity into our life relationships.

Remember, a structure is only as strong as the materials from which it is built. A strong spiritual house requires construction with lasting spiritual values. Add to this the spiritual disciplines of prayer and meditation, spiritual reflection, disciplines of forgiveness and reconciliation and you will build into your life values which can withstand the most severe onslaught.

## WE ARE THE LIGHT AND HOPE OF JESUS

# "God is Light, and in Him there is no darkness at all." – 1 John 1:5

Are you a beacon of hope and light to those you encounter? The world is in desperate need of hope. We have a LIVING HOPE within us who is JESUS CHRIST OUR LORD. Without Him, we are lost. The world is lost without Jesus, for there is no hope apart from Jesus, He is the Light of the World and the Light of our lives.

A lighthouse shines its beacon of light and hope into the darkness of night. The beacons warn of impending danger and guide vessels safely on their way.

## *"We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure."* – *Hebrews* 6:19
