Rev Maile Molitika - Minister's Message "Teach us to number our days"

I have come across three funerals recently and it was really sad to see the first one, a young beautiful lady who died as a result of an accident at Mapleton Falls. I conducted that funeral in our Nambour Uniting Church and I have to say, that was the biggest funeral that I have done since moving to Nambour in 2022. She was a member of Narcotics Australia, teaching the importance of acknowledging God to be released from habitual drug use.

The second funeral was a young niece of mine who died suddenly in Brisbane. It was a big funeral too, because the deceased was well known, leaving a wonderful legacy by her leadership and passion for the young people and kids in the Moreton Rivers Presbytery. The third one was an elderly woman, a faithful member of our Church in Nambour. We farewelled her on Monday and many members from our congregation came along to support the family in this time of sadness.

As I prepare to write this page for our NeXus Journal, I am conscious that my little grandson Jayden is still in the hospital after an open-heart surgery. Hopefully, he will come out from this storm of life.

This article I have written is a theological reflection on the importance of being prepared to face the reality of death. St. Paul is emphasising to the Philippians - "For to me, living is Christ and dying is gain." Psalm 90 teaches. God's eternal nature is contrasted with people's frailty, our time on Earth is limited and we are to use it wisely, not living for the moment, but with our eternal home in mind. In Psalm 90, Moses is praying that the people will know that the best dwelling place is in God. Our life span on earth is 70 or 80 if we are strong. Some have gone beyond that into their 90's and even into their 100's, but only God knows when our time is up. The verse that I want us to think about is verse 12 -

"Teach us to count our days that we may gain a wise heart."

For me, life is meaningless without God. Living a longer life is not important, <u>living a life with God is what counts</u>. The point of this reflection is to count our days, so that we may gain a wise heart. Time is given to us to be used in God's service. Do not postpone living. Make those important decisions that need to be made while we are still alive. Today is the only day we have.

A prayer: Lord, teach us to number our days so when we are called home, we have done what we were supposed to have done as your own faithful disciples. No wonder you have been with your disciples for 40 days, so they learned the truth of your resurrection before your ascension to be with the Father. Let us live life to the fullest because time is precious, time is short, time is uncertain, we pray through the name of Jesus Christ, Amen.

Once upon a time...

(a reflection on an old nursery fable about three little porkies!)

NOTE: For a fuller discussion of the topic refer to Avery Dulles, "Models of the Church" (ca 1970). Dulles identified 6 "models", including Community of Disciples, Herald of Grace, Sacrament and Servant.

Once upon a time there were three little churches...

The <u>first</u> was a very enthusiastic group of people whose primary focus was on lively worship. They had a ball when they came together, making a joyful noise unto the Lord! Coming to "church" was exciting, full of energy and enthusiasm, led by a group of singers accompanied by a full band. In fact, to a visitor it had all the appearances of being a Christian Disco! Only, the words were different. Everyone was glad to be there and shared noisy fellowship over morning tea afterwards. The big problem was that is was based on emotional experience, and the Tempter (Diabolos) knew it! He knew how to throw them with unsettling questions such as;

"Why does God allow innocent people to suffer?
Why do good people die young?
How can a just God allow abuse and violence to destroy others?"

Right from the beginning the Tempter has questioned the goodness of God, "Has God said...?" (Genesis 3:1) Curly questions are his specialty, disturbing our equilibrium, raising doubts in our minds, and casting dark shadows over our feelings of happiness. To be fair, the energy and enthusiasm of these people was often channelled into worthwhile projects to help those who are struggling, providing shelters for the homeless, food stores and op shops. However, a congregation built purely on emotional experience is a house of straw, vulnerable to the winds of doubt, depression and despair. Human emotion is inherently unstable, fickle and can change quite unpredictably. It lacks the ability to endure.

The <u>second</u> congregation knew better and built their church on strong doctrinal statements. Christian belief was set out in clearly defined doctrinal statements. It had everything listed in well formulated, logical "systematic" order. The good thing about it was that everybody knew exactly where they stood. Clever orators thundered it out Sunday by Sunday! Many found security in having everything spelled out for them in black and white terms. It appealed to the rational, cerebral side of human personality, but often ignored the affective, relational side of Christian faith. Their problem was myopia: it was too rigid and did not allow for any point of difference. All the Tempter had to do was to throw in a few questions of logic, a different perspective, or even find passages of scripture which differed from theirs and the fight was on! People began to align themselves with different understandings and very soon little sectarian sub-groups formed and the church split.

Protestantism is a testimony to splitting and splintering. It was a <u>house built of intellectual sticks</u>, and couldn't last.

The <u>third</u> congregation endeavoured to practice relational theology. Its people genuinely endeavoured to live out their Christian faith in relationships with others around them. It was Christo-centric, asking, "What would Jesus do?". They were deeply committed to being Christ's disciples, committed to the core values of forgiveness, reconciliation and genuine care for the "other". Grace was genuine but costly, willing to put others' needs before their own. There is a strong sense of community.

Their worship reflected their desire to be one in heart and mind, and represented a whole variety of styles and music. Doctrine was still important, but there was strong desire to listen and try to understand differences of interpretation as reflecting the variety of human experience, culture and personality. The Tempter tried in vain to disturb them, but they were grounded in costly grace and kept their focus on the Christ who gave Himself for each and every one.

The different bricks were held together by the mortar of Christ's love.

They were rock solid!

Try as he may, the Tempter could not destroy them. They had the mind of Christ! They would do anything to help each other! They could sing enthusiastically "We are one in the Spirit... and they'll know we are Christians by our love, by our love" and mean it!

YES, THEY'LL KNOW WE ARE CHRISTIANS BY OUR LOVE!
Now, that's the church to which I belong! Grace and peace!

I began reading the Bible at the beginning. Isn't that where one usually starts to read a book? I agonised between hope and despair.

Discouraged by Ecclesiastes, "it is better to be a live dog than a dead lion."

I PLOUGHED ON!

I was reading the New Testament when one night I knelt by the bed and said, "Lord, I believe", but instantly knew that I wasn't 100% sure, so I changed to "No I don't Lord, and You know I don't, help me believe".

I KEPT READING AND HOPING.

One morning I woke and knew I had to go back to sleep. I dreamt that Rod and I were at the kitchen table and Annette was standing there. She asked why we were so sad. I answered, "because you are dead". She looked through a book on the table, closed it and said, "He asked me to leave His house but I wouldn't".

I was shocked, totally lost for words! This was nothing like my perception of what God would say or do. I tossed this in the 'too hard basket' and asked her what it was like 'up there'. She replied that she couldn't tell me that. I went around the table to hug her, she didn't respond, and thought I will take her to school on Monday and tell the teacher that it is all a mistake, she is alive!

I was momentarily hurt that she had chosen God rather than me. Yet under the same circumstances I would have made the same decision.

There was a finality about it; a rightness in the middle of a wrong that defied argument.

God is perfect. Our understanding of Him isn't.

My questions were answered.

I thought it was an audacious act on my part to believe that God would speak to me, but maybe the idea was originally His!

Isn't there a thread that runs through the Bible saying,
"Come unto me ... seek and you shall find"
- so very, very simple. Why do we tend to make it all so complicated?

SOME QUESTIONS THAT YOU MAY NEED AN ANSWER TO, ABOUT GOD

IS GOD A HUMAN OR A GOD?

Since we humans were created in God's image then others would ask, "Is God human?" Well, the answer is no.

God is not human but a spirit, as attested to by our Lord Jesus Christ written here in John 4:24: God is spirit, and those who worship Him must worship in spirit and truth."



WHAT EXACTLY IS A GOD?

God, the supreme or ultimate reality, the perfect being in power, wisdom, and goodness who is worshipped (as in Judaism, Christianity, Islam, and Hinduism) as creator and ruler of the universe.

WHAT IS GOD MADE OF?

The classic answer is that God is not made of anything, at least not in a way we would understand. Because He is the Creator, He must pre-exist Creation, and he must, therefore, exist outside of created time and space, which means He cannot be made from that which exists within our space-time universe.

HAS ANYONE EVER SEEN GOD?

So, John 1:14, 18 says, "And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father. . . . No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, he has made him known." So, we see God by seeing Jesus.

WHO CREATED GOD?

No One Created God. He was there at the beginning of all things. But he himself was not made by another being. Consider Paul's words in Colossians 1:17, "He is before all things, and in him all things hold together." Everything we can see—and all that we cannot—comes from God.

DOES GOD HAVE A PHYSICAL BODY?

God is spirit, and as such he doesn't have a body (Luke 24:39: "A spirit does not have flesh and bone.") When the Bible speaks of our being made in his image, then, it doesn't mean we're like him physically. It means that, like God, we possess a spiritual aspect to our being.

WHY DID GOD CREATE US?

He created people out of love for the purpose of sharing love. People were created to love God and each other. Additionally, when God created people, he gave them good work to do so that they might experience God's goodness and reflect his image in the way they care for the world and for each other.


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WILL WE SEE GOD IN HEAVEN?

In heaven, we'll be in the presence of the Lord, and we'll see him face to face. My favorite verse about seeing God is 1 John 3:2: "Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears, we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is."

WHO IS GOD ACCORDING TO JESUS?

Jesus says that God is spirit. John 4:24, "God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." In other words, he's not physical. He's not material. He does not have a body as we know it.
